Developmental Milestones

(General Overview)

0-3 months

- Visual tracking
- Turns head both ways
- Notices hands
- Lifts head from prone
- Spontaneous movements of legs
- Good head control
- Midline orientation
- Simple grasps/release
- Visual tracking: following rattle with eyes
- Startles to loud sounds

- Quiets when spoken to
- Coos/makes throaty sounds
- Smiles when sees caregiver
- Cries differently for different reasons
- · Looks intently at speaker
- Turns head to both sides while on back
- Hold head up 45 degrees while on stomach
- Holds head in midline when held

4-7 months

- Grasping objects (blocks, paper)
- Rolls from stomach to back (vice versa)
- Pushes up from stomach
- Midline orientation
- Assists in raising head when pulled to sit from supine
- Bears weight on arms
- Props self on extended arms
- Sits unsupported briefly, propping forward
- Trunk control and good sitting balance
- Activating arms: waving arms in excitement, reaching for toys (to front and side)

- Using both hands to play with toys toward middle of body
- Transfers objects between hands
- Picks up more than one small object
- "Banging" objects on table
- Turns head to find sounds
- Babbling includes p,b,m
- Vocalizes excitement and displeasures
- Vocalizes when talked to, moving arms and legs
- Head is steady in supported sitting
- Pushes to sit from prone using rotation



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8-9 months

- Pulls up to half kneeling
- Assumes hands and knees position and rocks
- Props to side
- · Crawls forward on stomach
- Enjoys simple games, like peek-a-boo
- Picks up small objects (pegs, puzzle pieces, etc.)
- Crumples paper
- Clapping hands

- Protests with gestures or sound
- Vocalizes 2 vowels and 2 consonants
- Sits with no support
- Commando crawls
- Stands holding onto furniture
- Gets into sitting without assistance
- Pulls to stand at furniture

10-12 months

- Pulls to stand
- · Creeps on hands and knees
- Stands and Cruises
- Walks with one hand held
- Communicates nonverbally with gestures
- Responds to simple requests (come here, wave bye bye, play pattycake)
- Has 1 or 2 words

- Pointing finger, poking finger in hole
- Shaking toys
- Releasing objects on command
- Stands independently for 2-3 seconds
- Crawls on hands and knees
- Walks with both hands held

13-14 months

- Appropriately plays with shape sorter
- Turning pages (can be more than one at a time)
- Stacking blocks
- Placing simple shapes in puzzles
- Identifies familiar objects

- Puts 2 syllables together
- Follows simple commands with cues
- Listens to stories
- Plays with toys correctly
- Cruises along furniture
- Walks with one hand held
- Walks alone (2-3 steps)

15-17 months

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- Walks independently
- · Crawls upstairs
- Walks with narrow base
- Removing socks
- Specific placement of objects (pegs in pegboard)
- Imitating "scribble" on paper
- Identifies familiar objects

- Puts 2 syllables together
- Follows simple commands with cues
- Listens to stories
- Plays with toys correctly
- Transfers from sitting to standing independently
- Walks sideways

18-23 months

- Building tower with blocks (6-8)
- Walks up stairs with one hand held
- Walks confidently and safely
- Squats
- Pulling apart "pop beads"
- Building tower with blocks
- Stringing beads
- Snipping with scissors
- Walks backwards
- Throws ball forward

- Carries toy while walking
- Runs with some balance difficulties
- Walks up stairs and down stairs with one hand held, both feet on each step
- Points to named pictures
- Identifies body parts
- Imitates words
- Uses 5-10 words
- Puts 2 words together
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- Turning door knob
- Removing cap from bottle
- Uses spoon to feed self
- Walks up and downstairs
- Goes up and down stairs alone
- Stands on balance beam with both feet; attempts to step
- Kicks ball
- Jumps from bottom step (both feet together)
- Able to walk on tiptoes
- Throws ball 5 to 7 feet in vertical pattern

- Turning door knob- using wrist rotation
- Copying objects arrangement (building basic block design)
- Jumps up with both feet off floor
- Stands on one foot for one second
- Catches large ball
- Asks 1 or 2 word questions
- Identifies clothing items
- Names objects in pictures
- Uses many different consonant sounds at the beginning of words

30-35 months

- Keeps balance while walking on tiptoes
- Throws ball 5 to 7 feet in vertical pattern
- Takes a few alternative steps on balance beam
- Rides tricycle using pedals
- Goes up stairs alternating feet
- Stands on one foot and balances
- Walks with reciprocal arm swing
- Runs

- Copying circle
- Washing hands with wrist rotation
- Unbuttoning
- · Cutting across paper
- Jumps in place with both feet
- Hops on one foot
- Understands descriptive and spatial concepts (big, wet, little, soft, in, on, etc)
- Follows 2 step commands
- Uses 2-4 word sentences

36-41 months

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- Showing hand preference
- Dresses self (help with fasteners)
- Feeding independently
- Copying more difficult drawings (cross, etc.)
- Uses quantity concepts
- Names a variety of pictures

- Walks downstairs alternating feet while holding onto rail
- Identifies colors
- Understands pronouns
- Uses sentences of 4-5 words
- Answers questions logically

42-47 months

- Copying shapes
- · Gallops forward
- Cutting out circle
- Putting lace through shoe (not in order)
- Copying shapes (square, cross, etc.)
- Tracing line
- Identifies colorsHolding marker in "tripod" grasp

(resting 3rd finger, using thumb and index to guide pencil)

- Jumps down from object 12 inches high
- Answers questions logically
- Makes inferences (using clues to figure out situations)...

48-59 months

- Improved hand coordination
- Feeds self, eats soup without spilling
- Turns complete somersault
- · Balance on one foot
- Improved hand coordination
- Buttoning large buttons
- Placing paperclips on paper
- Hops in place

- Hop on one foot forward 10 feet
- Balance on each foot more than 5 seconds
- Repeats sentences
- Responds to where/why questions
- Folding paper

60-71 months



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- Connecting dots
- Coloring within lines
- Touch all fingers to thumb (quickly)
- Dress self completely
- Ties shoes
- Uses past tense forms

- Feeding (uses knife for spreading and cutting soft foods)
- Improved hand coordination
- Specifically placing small items (pennies, etc.)
- Uses grammatically correct sentences
